

Unmasking the Orient

Track 1: Chinese Language & Cultural Studies (4 AUs)

Overview

Delivered by NTU's Confucius Institute, this track is designed to equip students with basic Chinese language skills as well as expose them to the intriguing Chinese culture. It consists of 2 parts covering Chinese language and Chinese cultural studies. It will be conducted over 3 weeks from 19 May – 6 June 2014 (Term 1) and 30 June – 18 July 2014 (Term 2), Mondays to Fridays, 9.30am – 5.00pm, in the NTU campus.

Description

Part 1

The Chinese language course is **designed for non-Chinese** students who do not have any background on Chinese language. The course contents are topics-based to help you master basic conversational skills for day-to-day living. Basic reading and writing skills are also introduced to enhance the understanding of Chinese culture.

Participants will be able to conduct basic conversations as well as learning how to write basic strokes, character components and single-component characters. Learn up to 260 Chinese characters, 40 grammatical points and 300 commonly-used sentences.

Part 2

The Chinese cultural studies course aims to expose exchange students to the interesting aspects of Chinese culture, such as Embracing the Dragon: An Overview of China, Numbers in Chinese and Festivals in China, Chinese culture in the Singapore context etc

Through the 3-week cultural course, the students get a glimpse of the 5,000-year history of China as well as modern Chinese celebrities, and enjoy hands-on sessions on Chinese calligraphy, Chinese paper cutting, Chinese ink painting. They will also get to visit selected places-of-interest, which may include Asian Civilisations Museum, Tian Hock Keng Temple and Chinatown, Sun Yat Sen Nanyang Memorial Hall, Tea House etc.

Track 2:

Entrepreneurship & Innovation Asia (3 AUs per course)

Overview

Offered by the Nanyang Technopreneurship Centre, this track is designed to equip students with the fundamental entrepreneurship competencies, business acumen and stamina to build and grow businesses. Consisting of 4 courses (3 AUs per course), it will cover topics such as entrepreneurship, creativity, writing business plans, business accounting, intellectual property, marketing strategy, risk evaluation, financial projection, securing finances and managing team members.

The courses will be conducted over 5 weeks from 19 May – 20 June 2014 (Term 1) or 30 June – 1 August 2014 (Term 2), Mondays to Fridays, at the Nanyang Technopreneurship Center in NTU.

Students have the option to take minimum of two courses (6 AUs) and upto four courses (12 AUs) per run.

<p>Module 1: ET9131 (3 AU) Entrepreneurship & Marketing for New Ventures</p>	<p>Learn about new concepts such as entrepreneurship, creativity, innovation and new venture creation process. In addition, entrepreneurship marketing will be introduced, learn to select, develop and evaluate new products, set prices and make the most efficient use of public relations and publicity.</p> <p><i>Term 1: 19 – 26 May 2014 Term 2: 30 June – 7 July 2014</i></p>
<p>Module 2: ET9132 (3 AU) Entrepreneurial Accounting & Finance</p>	<p>Learn the basic accounting concepts, followed by financial concepts and tools relevant to entrepreneurs.</p> <p><i>Term 1: 27 May – 2 June 2014 Term 2: 8 – 14 July 2014</i></p>
<p>Module 3: ET9133 (3 AU) Managing New & Ongoing Ventures</p>	<p>This module consists of two parts: in the first part, organization and human resource management are introduced. In the second part, the focus is on writing a convincing business plan to attract venture capital investment.</p> <p><i>Term 1: 4 – 9 June 2014 Term 2: 16 – 23 July 2014</i></p>

Module 4: ET9134 (3 AU) Enterprise Strategy	<p>This is an immersive experiential learning module. Most aspects confronting new ventures will be covered: major business decisions that entrepreneurs face, setting up a business, developing and implementing business plans, conducting research and development, securing investments, growing the business and managing people.</p> <p><i>Term 1: 13 – 20 June 2014 Term 2: 24 July – 1 August 2014</i></p>

<p>Lessons are conducted by successful business leaders, entrepreneurs, intellectual property lawyers and dedicated academics with venture experience. PENNING YOUR JOURNEY IN THE EAST

Track 3:

Writing the New Silk Road (3 AUs per course)

Overview

Conducted by the School of Humanities and Social Sciences, this track focuses on the various genres of poetry, prose and film as the students recreate and tell their own Asian and Singapore journeys through writing, editing, and new media production tasks.

The creative writing track consists of four courses with 3 AU per course, which will be conducted over 4 weeks from 30 June – 30 July 2014 (Term 2), Mondays to Fridays, 9.00am – 5.00pm, in the NTU campus.

Students have the option to select a maximum of 2 writing courses and one other course from another track, subject to time-table and vacancies.

Description

<p>Module 1: HL2020 (3 AUs) World Poetry - A multimedia performance game</p>	<p>This is a multimedia writing, editing and performance class focused on poetry. In this course students will write and read a variety of poems, then choose their favourites to make into an illustrated card-deck anthology. They will then collaborate to devise a group performance based on <i>uta-garuta</i> game rules. No previous visual art or performance experience is necessary.</p> <p>Dates: 2 – 25 July 2014</p>
<p>Module 2: HZ9202 (3 AUs) Prose (fiction) - Voyages in Fiction</p>	<p>The aim of this course is to encourage students to recognize the world as the potentiality of fiction. Students will generate new writing both inside and outside the classroom, analyze published short stories in order to recognize their technique, and critique their own stories in a fun and supportive workshop environment. Our discussion will include the technical aspects of writing with an emphasis on what it feels like to engage with an idea and bring it to realization.</p> <p>Dates: 30 June – 23 July 2014</p>

Track 3: Writing the New Silk Road (3 AUs per course)

<p>Module 3: HZ9203 (3 AUs) Prose (non-fiction) - Home and Away</p>	<p>Where are you now and where are you coming from? In this course we will encounter and experiment with a variety of non-fictional forms, concepts and topics – memoir, biography, travelogue, local history, the lyric essay, image and text narratives, psychogeography, the flâneur, architecture, food, Nature – all in order to portray not only Singapore of the here and now, but the terrain of the past.</p> <p>Dates: 1-24 July 2014</p>
<p>Module 4: HZ9205 (3 AUs) Exterior Worlds - Writing for Film</p>	<p>The objective of this course is to introduce students to the major principles of creating narratives for film and developing professional screenplays. We will be looking at story structure, character, screenwriting formats and techniques and this will culminate in a writing project with close mentoring from the facilitator. This will be done within the context of the students' time in Singapore, with reference to the local film culture, and students will be encouraged to develop scripts inspired by their experiences here.</p> <p>Dates: 1-24 July 2014</p>



Track 4: Success in the Globalised Marketplace
(3 AUs per course)

Overview

Students who wish to gain all-round insights into the global skillsets required for today's competitive market place and the corporate world will be able to select from a range of business and humanities courses in this track.

The diverse range of courses include leadership, cultural intelligence, business finance, marketing, accounting, negotiation, working in the 21st century, design and animation etc. This track will be offered over 2 runs (5 weeks per run) from 12 May – 20 June 2014 (Term 1) and 30 June – 1 August (Term 2). Please refer to the exact dates for each course below:

Description

Module 1: BU8641 (3 AUs)
Cultural Intelligence: How to be an Explorer of the World

Cultural Intelligence (CQ) is the capability to function effectively across national, ethnic and organisational cultures. IQ and EQ are no longer enough, CQ is becoming a critical predator for success in the borderless world of the 21st century. This course will provide you with a conceptual framework for CQ, as well as a set of tools to navigate and explore the world.

Dates: 7-25 July 2014 (Term 2)

Module 2: BU8642 (3 AUs)
Leadership in the 21st century

This course aims to provide facilitate you to learn theoretical knowledge and practical skills (e.g., coaching, teambuilding, goal-setting, and conduct effective meeting). Through the on-line psychometric surveys, ongoing collaborative and peer learning processes, you will gain greater self-awareness about your own leadership style, strengths and weaknesses, and how to develop your leadership competencies throughout your career.

Dates: 30 June – 25 July 2014 (Term 2)

<p>Module 3: BU8501 (3 AUs) Marketing in the 21st Century</p>	<p>This course is designed for students who have chosen to specialise in disciplines other than business. This course will discuss the basic principles of marketing with a focus on its practice and how this understanding could potentially enhance the students' future performance in their chosen field. A hands-on approach is expected of students and activities have been incorporated to encourage observation and enhance analytical ability. The course will require you to analyse businesses, lead discussions and present your analysis and recommendations on selected organisation.</p> <p><i>Term 1: 12 June – 20 June 2014</i> <i>Term 2: 23 June – 1 August 2014</i></p>
<p>Module 4: BU8201 (3 AUs) Business Finance</p>	<p>This is an introductory course for non-business and non-accounting students. The course provides students with a broad understanding of the principles and practice of Business Finance/Financial Management with an emphasis on the major financial decisions made by companies and the valuation of investments made by them. Topics include the various forms of businesses, interest rates, time value of money, the linkage between risk and return, capital budgeting and capital structure, enhancing the value of firms through dividends issuing and use of derivatives etc. Students intending to take this course should be numerate (good and comfortable with mathematical calculations and formulas).</p> <p><i>Term 1: 12 June – 20 June 2014</i> <i>Term 2: 23 June – 1 August 2014</i></p>
<p>Module 5: BU8101 (3 AUs) Accounting: A User's Perspective</p>	<p>This course is designed for students who have chosen to specialise in disciplines other than business. This course will discuss the basic principles of marketing with a focus on its practice and how this understanding could potentially enhance the students' future performance in their chosen field. A hands-on approach is expected of students and activities have been incorporated to encourage observation and enhance analytical ability. The course will require you to analyse businesses, lead discussions and present your analysis and recommendations on selected organisation.</p> <p><i>Term 1: 12 June – 20 June 2014</i> <i>Term 2: 23 June – 1 August 2014</i></p>

<p>Module 6: HP8002 (3 AUs) Working in the 21st Century</p>	<p>This course aims to provide students with an understanding of some areas of study within the field of behavioural science that are relevant and applicable to the work situation. Working in the 21st Century emphasizes a practical approach to applying psychology in the workplace. The topics present four areas of interest - personality and work, occupational health, learning-performance, and career development. Empirical findings from applied research are used to explain psychological principles and concepts and the course emphasizes a practical approach to applying psychology in the workplace.</p> <p>Term 1: 12 June – 20 June 2014</p>
<p>Module 7: CE8002 (3 AUs) Getting What You Want Through Negotiations</p>	<p>What do you want to get out of the negotiation? Improve your <i>negotiation</i> skills with our course on <i>negotiating</i> mutually acceptable compromises. The course will equip you with the basic negotiation skills and applications on arriving at a win-win situation during negotiation: Approaches, styles & outcomes, Interpersonal communication, Argumentation; the Negotiation Process; Dealing with the difficulties; Working towards closure; Issues of gender, culture, perception, emotion; Use of power; Electronic negotiation</p> <p>Term 1: 12 June – 20 June 2014</p>
<p>Module 8: (3 AUs) Design: An Asian Perspective</p>	<p>This is a four week course for designers and design students who are practicing or studying graphics, product and interaction, a unique opportunity to design from Asia, seeking design ethos from the region, for the global society.</p> <p>The aim of this course is to encourage the participants to discover a personal voice, as expressed through their work, that has been illuminated by an informed study and working within Asia. Key to this course is the open yet informed approach to understanding various Asian cultures and heritage and exploring how they can play a role in the growth and development of the designer as global citizen.</p> <p>Term 1: 30 June – 25 July 2014</p>







APPLICATION PROCEDURES FLOWCHART








The Office of Housing & Auxiliary Services (HAS) shall notify the exact check-in date to summerNTU students as soon as the check-in dates are confirmed.

Programme Fee Policy

- The programme fees quoted above includes tuition and administrative & activities fees. It **does not** cover airfare and airport taxes, travel insurance, visas, accommodation, local travel, meals and personal expenses.
- Tuition fee is waived for nominated exchange students. For nominated Exchange students. 0.5 exchange spots shall be counted per incoming student. And, they shall be liable to pay for the administrative & activities fees and the accommodation fees to the Programme Office.
- On-campus accommodation fee is S\$28 per night (on twin sharing basis) but without a meal plan.
- The Administrative & Activity fee covers application; orientation; cultural & social activities; welcome and farewell sessions; and University Misc Fees (which includes compulsory Group Hospitalisation & Surgical Insurance (GHSI); computer fee; copyright fee; student health services; sports facilities) etc.
- All fees quoted are inclusive of the 7% Singapore Goods and Services Tax (GST).
- All fees paid are non-refundable unless otherwise specified. SummerNTU's cancellation and refund policy is applicable:



Exchange Withdrawal Policy <i>(before arrival at NTU)</i>	Exchange Students to inform the home university and NTU Office of Global Education & Mobility, 3 weeks prior to arrival to withdraw from the summer programme. This will <u>not</u> be counted towards the 0.5 spot of exchange. The Programme Administrative Fees <u>shall NOT be refunded.</u>
Exchange Withdrawal Policy <i>(after arrival at NTU)</i>	Exchange Students to inform the home university and NTU Office of Global Education & Mobility at any point in time on his/her withdrawal intentions. This will be counted towards 0.5 spot of exchange. The Programme Administrative Fees <u>shall NOT be refunded.</u>

Singapore is made up of not just one island but a main island with 63 surrounding islets. The main island has a total land area of 682 square km.


